February Club Speaker, Barrie Brown – "Conservation and Current Methods to Eradicate Predators."



Barrie opened his address with the startling information that each day at least 63,000 birds die because of predation. The "big three villains" are possums, stoats and rats. Fortunately, these animals do not like rivers so there are good natural boundaries which can define areas where eradication of predators is aided by the geography. But these predators can go to very high altitudes. Rats effective eradication programme must manage forests, townships, farmlands, alpine areas and tussock grasslands. 1080 poison remains the principal means whereby rats are controlled. The deer stalking community is encouraged to kill mountain tahr in the region where a drop is going to occur. This provides carrion for the kea to feed on, keeping them away from the 1080. *Pat Alley, Editor.*

Our **Speaker was Dr Cynric Temple-Camp**, pathologist and author, who gave us some tips on committing the perfect murder using examples from cases he has investigated. Firstly, police always look at the victim's partner first. Then, circumstantial evidence is best. A support group is necessary to get you off the charge, regardless of the evidence. This group works best if a well-known celebrity fronts it - preferably an All Black. Next, be aware that security cameras are everywhere. REBUS CLUB OF KHANDALLAH

Wairarapa Day Trip to Pukaha and Fell Locomotive Museum. A group of 18 enjoyed a day trip to the Wairarapa on 13 March. The first stop was at the Pukaha National Wildlife Centre at Mt Bruce, a captive breeding facility located in a protected native forest area. We started with a view of the rare Takahe feeding.

These are two of a total population of 500 birds. Then we learned about kiwi and the centre's breeding programme from an expert. None of us knew that Kiwi do not have a sternum, so they can accommodate such a large egg. But more, we were told females sometimes carry 2 eggs, which shocked us. Apparently the second egg is likely to be laid 20 days after the first one. In the wild, the male sits on the eggs until they hatch, then the chicks are entirely on their own.

After a generous lunch we departed for the **Fell Locomotive Museum in Featherston**. Fell was the name of the man who set up the system. The



museum housed one of the engines used for the railway that ran high over the Remutakas, through a short tunnel, from 1870 to 1955 (when the current longer tunnel opened). It is remarkable that the same technology was in use for 85 years. We had an expert explain the complex and novel system for operation. A centre rail was used by horizontal driven wheels to provide extra traction for the uphill journey. The same centre rail was then part of the braking system when going downhill. This intriguing system was operated by a steam locomotive that ran both normal wheels and the horizontal ones. *Sharon Major, Newsletter Editor.*
