

absorbing story to hear about this interesting group of self-sufficient people who are using their skilled traditional weaving in order to survive. **Borneo Bags**, set up by Jacky 20 years ago, is a social enterprise where all profits are returned to the Penan weavers. She brought exquisite bags and mats for us to purchase. She also gave us a demonstration of Penan blow darting – quite a feat in our old Ferndale House setting!
