Peter was born in South Africa, where he was involved in the shipping business. His father was a newspaperman, so he inherited a thirst for reading, seeking out the truth, and history of world events, which made him a well-informed debater on many topics – a principled man. He was the writer, **Jane Austen's** No. 1 fan. He also loved cars, and owned two original Austin Sevens, the first of which he named **Jane**.

Mini Speaker: was Jim Miller who spoke about "Understanding your Carbon Footprint and making conscious choices". Jim gave us many interesting statistics about what makes up our carbon footprint using the Carbon Neutral NZ Trust, firstly based on a 2-person household for electricity and gas. Wood also has a carbon footprint when burnt. Regarding transport he gave statistics for cars, ferries, trains, buses and taxis, also the difference between an average car, a new car and an electric car. He gave statistics for recyclable waste which goes to Hampton Downs from here and non-recyclable waste. International travel is a big emitter of C02, one return trip to Europe in economy 5400kg, premium economy 8600kg and business 15600kg due to the amount of space taken. 15kg per week of food and green waste emits 478kg C02 p.a., this can be reduced by having a worm farm and/or compost. Eating: Beef emits 10.8kg, lamb 8.6kg, pork 2.1kg, fish 1.2kg, chicken .8kg and vegetarian .3kg (all per serving) If one eats meat 5 days a week that amounts to 4 tons of C02 p.a.

Guest Speaker, distinguished earth scientist **Emeritus Professor Vince Neall**, presented a fascinating and thoughtprovoking slideshow about the geology of the Manawatu region. The Wellington Fault Line, easily visible near



Woodville, indicates where two tectonic plates are colliding, the Pacific Plate on the east being subducted beneath the Australian Plate on the west. Earthquakes and vertical land upheavals have caused major instability in the greywacke rock in the Manawatu Gorge.

An outing to **The Gables**, an early homestead near Awahuri, enabled a group of us to inspect ten classic **Daimler** cars, after which we had a guided tour of the **Ohakea War Memorial Hall** – two volunteer staff enthused about the excellent collection of models, aircraft parts and memorabilia from NZ's aviation history based at Ohakea. 

SOUTH WAIRARAPA REBUS CLUB

Guest Speaker, Roger Barton, the well-known Wairarapa farmer and stud sheep breeder, told us a few stories about shepherding, shearing and the early history of the Golden Shears, Masterton's 'ultimate shearing and wool handling event in the world.' The first YFC competition in 1958 was so successful that it became an annual event. In 1961, with the assistance of Federated Farmers, the event was moved to the Masterton War Memorial Stadium, where nearly 300 shearers from NZ and Australia competed, Ivan Bowen becoming the first Golden Shears champion.

Roger has his eye on the 2026 event in Masterton, which this time will incorporate the Golden Shears World Shearing Championship. He assisted the 2024 event by arranging transport of 3850 sheep, the 2026 event calls for 5500 sheep! The demise of the Wool Board in 2001 meant the loss of its facilities and personnel for training new shearers. In 2004, The Wool Shed Museum was devised to provide a home for the oral histories of past Golden Shears Champions, and focus on sheep and wool history in Masterton. Five days after Roger's address, club members visited The Wool Shed for a guided tour and an opportunity to interact with spinners, weavers and other wool crafters who meet there on Wednesdays. Guest Speaker for August: Dame Anne Salmond. Dame Anne Salmond is a Distinguished Professor in Māori Studies and Anthropology, and a former Pro-Vice-Chancellor (Equal Opportunity) at the University of Auckland. She has written a series of prize-winning books about Māori life, European voyaging and cross-cultural encounters in the Pacific. She served as Chair of the NZ Historic Places Trust and has written a number of submissions on Te Tiriti o Waitangi for the Waitangi Tribunal. In 2013 Dame Anne won the Rutherford Medal, New Zealand's top scientific award, and became the New Zealander of the Year. She is a Foreign Associate of the National Academy of Sciences in the US, Corresponding Fellow of the British Academy, and Foreign Member of the American Philosophical Society. In 2021 she was awarded the
