**Main Speaker**: **Garth Dutton** who is the chairman of **Rebus NZ Inc**. and also belongs to Hibiscus Coast and Gulf Harbour Rebus clubs. However, he spoke to us about 50 years as a 'cop'. Garth was born in Little River and then moved to South Canterbury. He left school at 15 and moved to Christchurch where he joined the post office before applying to be a police officer. In 1965 he undertook 3 months training at Trentham, whilst there, turning 19. He was taught law, physical training and first aid before being sent to Napier. Later, he did courses in criminal analysis and homicide clerking. He

then became a drug detective and was the sole contact for undercover agents. He was the first person to do helicopter cannabis recovery, telling how flying out of Whangamata there were cannabis plantations in the bush everywhere.

**Mini Speaker: Gabrielle Young from Terra & Tide**, a company promoting regenerative tourism started in 2016. They have a 42 ft. catamaran on which they do eco-sailing. They care for their guests and also care for the environment. Their tourist vans are all electric. Guests learn about predator free Waiheke, and they are in partnership with "Love our Wetlands". They had over 900 guests last year.


#### **REBUS CLUB OF FEILDING**

#### **REBUS CLUB OF MT HOBSON**

Club Speaker, July, Pat Alley "The Great Plague of the 14th Century." Although the plague has existed in various forms for many millennia his address concentrated on the 14th century **Black Plague**. While it only lasted for 7 years it decimated the population. Some accounts say that at least half of Europe's population died from this pandemic and population numbers were not restored for another 200 years. The disease is caused by a micro-organism transmitted by fleas who have been in contact with infected rats. The commonest is **bubonic plague** which initially infects the lymphatic tissue but rapidly spreads to other organs. There is also a **pneumonic** form which is rapidly fatal. 14th century European society was unstable and depressed. There was famine, abject poverty and climatic conditions were severe with an enduring winter caused by a mini-

Ice Age. This episode of the plague started in Kaffa, a town on the southern end of the Crimean Peninsula. Here, a Genoan outpost was besieged by Russian and Mongolian troops. They carried the plague to this town and by catapulting the victims of their own people over the city walls, infecting the Genoans who rapidly returned to Italy carrying with them the plague, which then spread to the rest of Europe over the next seven years. The immediate effects of the plague were a very high mortality up to 60%. Quarantine, social distancing, mask wearing, lockdowns, strict regulations, government support for victims and strong leadership were all evident during this episode of the plague. Interestingly the lessons of the 14th century were forgotten by some in the recent COVID-19 outbreak. Plague is still with us. Up to 3000 cases annually are reported with a mortality of between 5 and 10%. It is endemic in California and Peru and is now a "normal" part of biological warfare. Pat Alley, Newsletter Editor.

Our Guest Speaker on 26 July was Hon Ron Mark, Mayor of Carterton, who spoke first about his recent work in Ukraine, showing a video of assisting with aid delivery and illustrating the massive effort needed there to get roads and buildings functional.

Then he regaled us with his life story, being uplifted as a ward of the state at age 3½, living in six different Pākehā foster homes before being put in the custody of the army at 16. There he learned discipline and a real work ethic, later being selected for officer training. Notable in his service record is a 13-month tour of duty in the Sinai as part of the Egypt/Israeli cease fire agreement.

He spent six terms as a list member of parliament for NZ First, including three years as Senior Whip in coalition with National and three years as Minister of Defence and Veterans in coalition with Labour and the Greens. He served as Mayor of Carterton from 2010 to 2014 and again from 2022. He continues to be driven to fix problems that he sees around him and is very proud of the service he has been able to provide both internationally and in his work with troubled youth. 


#### CAMBRIDGE MEN'S REBUS CLUB
